Welcome to the 78th Llangynidr Garden Show

It was lovely to see so many exhibitors and visitors at our 2022 Garden Show after two years' enforced absence from the Village Hall. This year we have tweaked a few classes and added some new ones and hope to see even more of you exhibiting and coming to enjoy the spectacle.

Last year's big innovation was the introduction of our **Family Display** class – see page 10 for how to enter a mixed display of things grown and made by any member of your family. The only rule is that your family group must include one or more children of primary or nursery school age. Otherwise, entertain us and amaze us with your displays! The Family Displays are judged by visitors to the Show.

In 2023 we are making the **Summer Growing Challenge for Primary and Nursery School Children** part of the Garden Show – see pages 24 and 25. The idea is not to have a formal competition but to make a big display of plants the children have grown.

There's a note of how to enter the Show on the back of this Schedule. Everyone can enter two exhibits in each class – 50p each adult and family class entry; 16 and under free. Remember that children can enter any class for their age group and above. There are some Hints for exhibitors on pages 13 and 16 (horticultural classes) and 19 (domestic classes).

It's the exhibitors who make the Show, so don't be shy! Nobody really knows until a couple of days before the Show whether their flowers or fruit or veg are going to be in tip top condition on the Sunday. Every entry makes the Show more glorious.

We look forward to seeing you on Sunday 27 August.

GARDEN SHOW RULES

1. Entry forms and fees must be deposited at Walnut Tree Stores, Llangynidr, or sent to the Show Treasurer at the address on page 2, or you can email your entries to gardenshowllangynidr@gmail.com by 2pm Wednesday 23 August.

Entry forms can be difficult to email so you may instead email a list of your entries, being careful to note your name and contact details, the class numbers and descriptions, the number of entries in each class and where appropriate the ages of any children.

Payment may be made in cash or cheque. Cheques should be made payable to Llangynidr Garden Society. If entering by email, payment must be made when setting up on the day of the show.

More entry forms are available at the shop, village hall, pubs, chapels and church and to download at www.llangynidrshow.org: click on 'Garden Show'.

- 2. **Exhibits to be staged between 8.30am and 10.30am** on the day of the show. The hall will be closed for judging at 10.30am.
- 3. Show opens by 1.30pm and closes at 4.30pm.
- 4. **Exhibits should be removed between 4.30pm and 5pm**. Any exhibits left in the hall after 5pm may be removed by the Committee and disposed of.
- 5. Class entry cards should be collected from the 'Entries' stand in the hall after 8.30am.
- 6. Exhibitors are to provide their own white paper plates, plain vases, etc to display their exhibits.
- 7. An exhibitor may enter only 2 exhibits per class.
- 8. All exhibits in the flower, fruit and vegetable sections must have been grown in the garden or allotment of the exhibitor, except pot plants, which should have been in the exhibitor's care for at least 2 months.

- 9. Craft items and pictures must have been created during the past year. If possible, pictures should be displayed on stands or mini easels.
- 10. The committee accepts no responsibility for the safe custody of any exhibit.
- 11. Points awarded will be 3, 2, 1 for 1st, 2nd, 3rd prizes respectively, except where otherwise stated.
- 12. Objections must be made in writing and given to the Show Secretary before 3pm on the day of the show, together with a deposit of £1, which will be refunded if the objection is upheld. The judge's decision is final.
- 13. There will not be a presentation ceremony.
- 14. A list of prize winners will be created and appear in Contact, on Facebook and the Llangynidr Agricultural Show website.
- 15. **Cups and trophies**, as well as prize money, should be collected from the Treasurer in the hall between 4.30pm and 5pm. Any money not collected by 5pm will be returned to Garden Show funds.
- 16. The Garden Show raffle will be drawn at 4pm.
- 17. All cups previously awarded must be returned in a clean condition to the Cup Secretary, Show Secretary, or any member of the committee when notified.
- 18. Any child attending the Garden Show should be accompanied by a parent or other responsible adult.

Space: table 100cm x 50cm with some space round it.

Where: in the paved area in front of the hall with some shelter in case of rain.

The family display is judged by visitors to the Show from opening till 3pm when judging sheets are collected for counting.

The Glaisfer Trophy for the best Family Display is a wooden bowl or platter for the winning family to keep.





HINTS FOR EXHIBITORS—HORTICULTURAL

- 11, 12, 13 **Tomatoes**: they come in all shapes, colours and sizes. Five on a plate should be well matched ripe fruit. We have separate classes for the very small "cherry" tomatoes (Sungold, for example) and for the larger ones. Don't worry if you put the wrong class on your entry form the judge and stewards will move your exhibit. A truss of tomatoes is judged on whether the fruit are well developed and similar in size don't worry if the ones right at the end are not ripe.
- 19 **Culinary herbs:** judged as much on the display as the quality and freshness of the herbs.
- 23, 24, 25 Dahlias: what a varied and complicated group of flowers! Our three dahlia classes are for (a) three of the same type; (b) three different types; and (c) a vase of mixed "small" or "garden" dahlias. So you would enter your best "show" dahlias in the first two classes and vases of smaller border dahlias in the third one. This year we are not specifying which type of dahlia (cactus, decorative, single, pompon etc) to put in your "show" entries. So for the first class you won't put a round pompon with a frilly cactus because their differences are obvious, but it doesn't matter if you make a technical mistake between types that look the same to you. You may display three blooms in the same vase or separate ones.

HINTS FOR EXHIBITORS - HORTICULTURAL

- 23-29 **Flowers:** no added foliage in the vase, please. Make sure petals and leaves are clean and remove damaged bits and pieces. Imagine your flowers looking at the judges (as well as the other way round).
- 30-33 **Pot plants**: clean the pot and clean up the plant(s) remove dead and damaged leaves and flowers. Keep turning your pot round so that it gets the light on all sides and the plants grow evenly.
- 35-36 Vegetable display and Basket of vegetables for the kitchen: are these different? Yes. The display is judged primarily on presentation as well as the quality and variety of the vegetables (at least 5). The kitchen vegetable basket is for you to show 3 or more different vegetables you would use in everyday cooking here quality is more important than presentation. (Your "basket" could also be a box.)

HINTS FOR EXHIBITORS - DOMESTIC

Here are some tips and the recipe for the Domestic section.

- **Sourdough:** if you are trying sourdough for the first time the important element is your starter dough. You might be able to get some starter and tips on looking after it from a friend who already makes sourdough. To make your own there are lots of recipes available or you could buy a starter kit for example Kilner makes a kit including jars and recipe. To test when your starter is ready to use, drop a teaspoonful into a bowl of cold water if it's bubbly and airy enough to float, it's ready.
- 43 **Vegetarian canapes**: these can be whatever recipe you like but must be wholly home-made, including any toast, cracker or pastry bases.
- 51 Courgette loaf recipe:

2 large eggs 2 tsp cinnamon 125ml vegetable oil 2 tsp ginger 85g soft brown sugar Pinch nutmeg

350g courgette, coarsely grated 1/2 tsp bicarbonate of soda 1 tsp vanilla extract 1/2 tsp baking powder 85g walnut, roughly chopped 140g sultanas

200 - - 1-i- flam

300g plain flour

Heat oven to 180°C/ 160°C fan/gas 4. Line a 2lb loaf tin with baking parchment. In a large bowl whisk eggs, oil and sugar then add courgettes and vanilla. In another bowl combine the remaining ingredients and a pinch of salt. Stir the dry ingredients into the wet mixture then pour into the tin. Bake for 1 hour or until a skewer comes out clean. Leave to cool.

- Jams and jellies: clean jars; labels showing day/month/year of making. Skim off any scum when boiling to improve appearance. Saucer test for setting: take a teaspoon of the preserve and tip onto a really cold saucer; push your finger through the jam; if it's ready it will crinkle. Jelly bags can be improved with a piece of muslin inside the bag to ensure a really clear jelly.
- 59 **Chutneys:** should have a mature flavour having been potted for at least 2-3 months.
- Kimchi: choose whichever vegetables you like cabbage, other brassicas, kohlrabi, beetroot and fennel all work and if you are more adventurous you may mix it up a bit! If you are new to fermentation there are lots of recipes around.

HINTS FOR CHILDREN'S CLASSES

Remember to put the child's age as well as their name on the exhibitor card—there will be a space for this—so that the stewards can help the judges note where, for example, a child is entering a class above his or her actual age group.

THE SUMMER GROWING CHALLENGE FOR PRIMARY AND NURSERY SCHOOL CHILDREN—LET'S MAKE A FABULOUS DISPLAY

Here are some plants to grow in the summer - carrot tops, beans, cress and nasturtiums. You could also make a mini—greenhouse.

ENTRY FORMS: you don't need to say on your entry form which plants you will exhibit—you just need to put 'Growing Challenge' and give the class number and your age so we know roughly how many exhibits to expect

You might want to start before the holidays—beans and cress will grow quite quickly but nasturtiums need a couple of months. You might want to practise the cress—grow some to eat at home and then another crop for the Show. Bring them to the Show and exhibit them on the Growing Challenge table. Grow and exhibit as many plants as you like

If your nasturtiums flower before the Show, take a photo, print it off and bring it to the Show. Put your name and age on the back.

WHAT DO YOU NEED TO GET STARTED? Lots of people grow these things so ask around to see if some friends have spare seeds. If you can't find any, ask at the Walnut Tree Stores for a Summer Growing Challenge pack (available after Easter).

CARROT TOPS: Put some wet kitchen roll on a saucer. Place carrot tops on the paper. Keep it moist and watch the green shoots grow.

You can do this in different ways - put some marbles or little pebbles in a dish. Fill it with water and balance your carrot tops in the stones.

You will get green leaves and maybe some white lacy flowers. But you won't get carrots this way - they need seeds and soil.



BEANS IN A JAR: Roll blotting paper or kitchen roll round into a cylinder. Put the cylinder in a jam jar.



Soak a couple of big beans overnight - broad beans or runner beans or borlotti beans are good.

Tuck your beans down the side of the jam jar. Put enough water in the jar to keep the paper moist. Watch the roots grow down and the shoots come up.

EGGBOX CRESS: Fill the egg box with cotton wool or compost. Sprinkle on cress seeds. Keep it watered and watch the cress grow.

You can do this in eggshells or yoghurt pots too. Draw a face on your pot and the cress will grow like hair.

When it's long enough, take your photo then chop off the cress and eat it! Lovely in an egg sandwich.



JOLLY NASTURTIUMS: Fill a pot with compost or soil from the garden. You can use any sort of pot, but make sure it's got some drainage holes in the bottom, so your plant doesn't drown. Put three seeds in your pot, well spaced out. (Some people think it helps to soak the seeds overnight first, but don't worry if you don't - they will still grow.)

Keep the pot in a warm, sunny spot and remember to water it, but not too much - the soil should feel dry before you water.

You should see tiny shoots in about two weeks and if you are lucky your flowers will be coming out around Show time. Don't worry if you're still waiting for the flowers - bring your plant so everyone can admire it, then take it home and watch the flowers open.

Did you know that you can eat nasturtium leaves (they taste peppery) and flowers? Some nasturtiums are short and some are long. You can let the long ones trail down or put in a stick or wigwam



MINI GREENHOUSE:

Cut a clear 1 litre plastic bottle in half. Make drainage holes in the bottom. Fill this half with soil and plant seeds. Put top part back on without the cap. Put in a sunny spot and water regularly.
