




Ingredients:

25g (1oz) butter + extra to grease 2 tsp clear honey
400g (14oz) caster sugar 25g (1oz) white chocolate, roughly chopped
300ml (½ pt) double cream 50g (2oz) whole almonds, toasted and roughly chopped

Method:

1. Generously butter 17cm square tin and line with baking parchment.
2. Put the butter, sugar, cream and honey in a large heavy-bottomed pan and heat gently, stirring the mixture together.
3. Make sure all the sugar has dissolved by dipping the back of a teaspoon into the mixture and running your finger down it. Keep heating and stirring if any remains.
4. When the sugar has dissolved turn the heat up to medium to get a rolling boil. Continue to stir for around 15 mins. The mixture will go from looking like white sauce to the colour of thick set honey. Take the pan off the heat and stir in the chocolate and almonds.
5. Beat well for 5 mins until the mixture loses its shine and becomes thick and pasty.
6. Tip into the prepared tin and smooth over. Mark into squares and leave to cool.

111 **Special Class : Farmhouse cider and marmalade cake** Approx 7" cake tin

Ingredients:

Zest of 1 orange (or 1 lemon)
12 oz sieved self raising flour 2 eggs
Pinch of salt 2 tablespoons thick cut orange (or lemon) marmalade
6 oz butter or margarine ¼ pint cider
6 oz Demerara sugar Fresh orange juice
10 oz mixed dried fruit

Method:

1. Prepare an 7" cake tin, greased and lined and heat the oven to 180°C/Gas 4/350°F.
2. Sieve flour and salt into a bowl and rub in the fat until mixture is like breadcrumbs.
3. Stir in the sugar, fruit and orange zest, mixing thoroughly
4. Whisk eggs and add marmalade, cider and a little orange juice to the mixture.
5. Put into the tin and bake for about 1½ hours until golden brown.
6. Place on a wire rack when cool

A collection of three types of vegetables taken from the following list of fifteen, (quantity required in brackets) :

Carrots (3), Cauliflowers (2), Onions (3), Parsnips (3), Peas (6 pods), Potatoes (3), Runner beans (6 pods), Tomatoes (6), French beans (6 pods), sweetcorn (2), Pepper (3), cucumber (2), courgettes (3), red beet (3), aubergines (2).

Each type of vegetable will be judged out of a total of 20 points.

7 points for size, shape and colour, 7 points for condition, 6 points for uniformity.

Total marks out of 60.

All vegetables are to be displayed for effect, **within an area 45cm by 60cm (18 x 24ins)** without bending any part of them. No part of any exhibit may exceed the size of the tray, or the area marked out on the staging. Where a tray has a lip or edge it is the internal measurements that must not exceed 45cm x 60cm.

A black cloth is permitted, or the tray may be painted. Parsley is allowed for garnishing, but no other foliage or accessories, such as plates, sand, rings etc. will be allowed.

Onion tops may be tied or whipped using raffia or string.

Carrots and parsnips must have foliage trimmed back to 3".

Peas and beans must be displayed with some stalk attached.

Tomatoes must be displayed with calyces (the green flower bud case).

Judges may handle exhibits, open pods etc to check for quality.

The tray/board or staging must not be cut or mutilated in any way at all—such as cutting holes for standing onions in.

(Judges will use their discretion when judging, remembering that entries may come from inexperienced exhibitors)

The points will be clearly marked on the exhibitors' cards.

The winner will receive a Garden News certificate plus a £10 D.T. Brown seed voucher.

Second place will receive a £5 D.T. Brown seed voucher.

Third place will receive a £3 D.T. Brown seed voucher.

85 **Garden News Top Vase Rules 2015**



A vase of mixed flowering stems containing a total of between 5 and 10, taken from a minimum of two different **kinds** of plants (not 2 varieties of the same plant i.e. Pinks, carnations and Sweet William - which are all dianthus - would not be classed as different kinds.)

The display will be judged out of a total of 35 points. This will be split into two sections as follows.

25 points for the colour, form, condition, quality and freshness of the flowers

10 points for the overall presentation and effects of the flowers in the vase.

The vase will be viewed from all directions.

Stems used in the display must be showing flowers only, no seed heads or berries will be allowed. (continued overleaf)

85 Garden News Top Vase Rules 2015 (continued)

Use only fresh home-grown flowers. No dried or silk flowers allowed.

The vase can be any shape and size and made from any material, but must be in proportion to the display. No marks are allowed for the vase itself.

No accessories such as bows and additional foliage will be allowed. Foliage which is growing naturally from the flower stem, and still attached to that stem, is allowed.

Packing material - including Oasis - to keep the stems in place is allowed.

(Judges will use their discretion when judging, remembering that entries may come from inexperienced exhibitors)

The points will be clearly marked on the exhibitors' cards.

The winner will receive a Garden News certificate plus a £10 Mr. Fothergill's seed voucher.

Second place will receive a £5 Mr. Fothergill's seed voucher.

Third place will receive a £3 Mr. Fothergill's seed voucher.

(Vouchers to be used by December 31 2015 for seeds via mail order only)

(The same vase can be entered twice with Class 69 with an additional entry fee.)

Section C Floral Art

All fresh plant material except succulents must be in water retaining substances e.g. oasis.

No artificial fruits or flowers may be used in any exhibit.

Preserved natural material may be used in any exhibit.

Exhibits must be contained within the space limits given.

150g light muscovado sugar

125ml sunflower oil

3 medium eggs

150g SR gluten free flour

75g cornflour

½ tsp xanthan gum

½ tsp bicarbonate of soda

½ tsp gluten free baking powder

1 tsp mixed spice

2 tbsp water

250g grated carrots


Method:

1. Warm oven to 180°C/Gas 4.
2. Put the sugar in a bowl and whisk in the oil and eggs, one at a time.
3. Sift the flour, cornflour, xanthan gum, bicarbonate, baking powder and mixed spice.
4. Add this to the bowl, mixing well. Add the water to loosen the mixture
5. Stir in the carrots and ensure an even mix.
6. Divide the mixture between 10 –12 muffin cases and bake for about 20 – 25 mins.
7. Allow to cool and decorate with glaze icing (125g icing sugar with approx 3 dessert spoons of hot water) adding ½ tsp cinnamon. Topped with chopped nuts (own choice) or orange zest.
